The AP reports that U.S. factory orders rose 1.2 percent in August, “driven by strong gains in aluminum and other metals, industrial machinery and autos.”

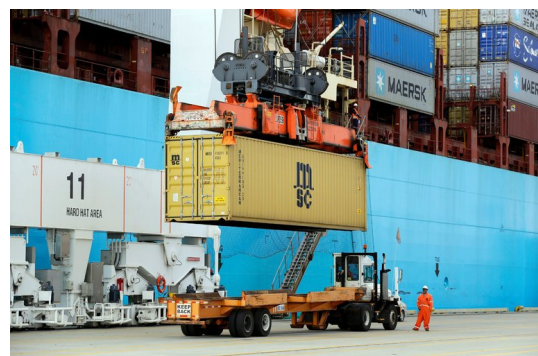
